CHILDREN AND ROAD SAFETY

Dear parents and guardians,

It is important for children to be able to walk to school – first accompanied by adults, and later in groups with other children. Over time, they gain confidence and are able to make the journey to school independently. They spend time with other children, learning to show consideration and respect for each other. They make friends, discover the world around them through their own eyes and learn something new every day.

Between the ages of four and eight in particular, children need our help and support so they can learn to walk to school on their own. Their hearing and reactions are not yet as developed as they are in adults, and estimating speeds and distances is also still highly challenging. Adults have the important task of acting as role models for children on the roads, explaining dangerous situations to help children understand the reasons behind the rules they are taught.

The most important rule children learn in school is "Stop, look, listen, walk." "Stop" means stopping at every road crossing and waiting. The child looks in both directions, listens and only crosses the road once any approaching vehicles have come to a complete stop. When adults practise these rules with children, they make a key contribution to the child's independence on the road.

Children should be dressed in light-coloured clothing whenever possible when they are in traffic – high-visibility bands (provided in kindergarten) or vests (provided in primary school) should be worn at all times. This hugely increases their visibility.

Children are taught the basic rules of the road in road safety lessons with the local police at school. Study Eddie's booklet with your child and ask them to tell you what they have already learnt.

We hope you enjoy helping your child with their learning.

The pavement is the part of the street you go to school on. But are there other people and vehicles on the pavement apart from you?



Find the scooter on the picture sheet, cut it out and stick it in the right place below.






ON THE ROAD








ON A PEDESTRIAN CROSSING


