CHILDREN LEARN IN TRAFFIC

Dear Parents and Guardians,

The way to school is a very important part of everyday life for children. This is where they make friends, explore the world with their own eyes and at the same time develop their social skills in dealing with other children. They learn to consider each other, help each other and also exchange experiences. Walking to school is also healthy and provides regular exercise.

For children to be able to be independent road users, they need support from us adults. Children learn from us, we are important role models for them. This booklet is a practical aid for parents, grandparents and other people who play an important part in the children's life and can be used to study traffic and its dangers together with the children. The picture sheet inside the booklet stimulates children to actively participate in the exercises.

The booklet contains exciting questions on various road traffic topics. The answers to the questions are at the bottom of the relevant page. Go through each of the questions with the child and leave enough time for stories and imaginative ideas. The five units can easily be divided into several learning sessions.

The basic rule for crossing the road safely is, «wait, look, listen, walk». A child should learn to first wait at the kerb before stepping onto the pedestrian crossing. The child looks left. If vehicles are approaching the pedestrian crossing, the child waits until the wheels of each vehicle have come to a complete stop. Then the child looks right. The child only starts to cross the road if all approaching vehicles have come to a standstill, the child has looked left and right, and listened to the traffic again.

This is how a child learns to cross the road. And only if all adults follow these rules, children are safe on the road. As a driver, it is therefore essential to refrain from waving children across the road and to make sure you always stop the car completely. Vehicles moving slowly towards the pedestrian crossing irritate children and are dangerous.

- 3. Find the scooter on the picture sheet, cut it out and stick it in the right place below.





- 4. Cut out the small yellow car, the bus and the police car from the picture sheet and stick them in the right place.






